

Why Don't We Pray?

The bible speaks of prayer as though it is just common sense. There is no particular place in the bible where prayer is introduced. When Jesus taught the disciples how to pray, giving them what we now call the Lord's Prayer, he was responding to their request: teach us *how* to pray – not what is that thing you are doing? (Matt 6). The idea or practice of prayer, in the bible, is just a matter of fact.

Read Genesis 3:8

What beautiful image is described in the first part of the verse?

What is the problem described in the second part of the verse?

Here are three reasons that cover the basis of why we tend not to pray or that we pray far less than we should.

Reason One: God Will Do Just What God Wants

Firstly, we believe that God already has a plan and **God will do just** what he wants. How could my prayers possibly make a difference to God's plans?

Does this sound true to you?

Reason Two: God Already Knows What We Need

Secondly, we have in our minds that **God already knows what we need** - so why bother him with the details. Since God knows everything and the bible tells us that he knows our thoughts before we speak them (Psalm 139), then prayer feels a little obsolete or redundant.

Does this sound true to you?

Reason Three: Our Time Is Too Precious

Perhaps a natural outcome of believing the first two statements is our third reason - our time is precious. We already know that our lives are busy and we have plenty of things to do - so let's just get on with it. God will do what God does - he knows already what I need - I know what I need to do, so let's all just get on with it. Ok?

Does this sound true to you?

Interestingly, the reasons why we should pray, are also the three reasons why we think we don't need to! When we look at these same statements, with a proper understanding of them, they should lead us to prayer. So, let's look again at the three statements and see that they are more of a reason to pray than a deterrent from praying.

God is Sovereign – he will do all that he pleases

God's sovereignty means that He is in complete control of everything: 'from international intrigue to the smallest bird-fall in the forest.'3

Read Psalm 115:3; Isaiah 46:10 & Daniel 4:35

God Is In Control And All His Plans Will Succeed:

- 1) God is alone in his divine authority,
- 2) He is in control of the events of time,
- 3) He will call things into action just as he has planned them.

What That Means For Us

Recognising that God is sovereign means that **we are not** in control of all things. This does not just mean that there are things in the universe that are outside of our command - that is obvious. No, this means that our lives are also in submission to God's sovereignty. We may make plans to do this or that, but if those plans are not God's plans, then our plans will fail. We will become frustrated with our attempts to move forward and get things done because it is God's will that will triumph.

Read Proverbs 16:1-9

What is this passage saying about human plans?

Knowing God is sovereign means I need to talk to God about my plans.

God Is Personal: He Cares About You

The second complaint about prayer was that God already knows what we want before we ask and so there is no point in asking him. This is a distorted idea of one of the greatest things about God. **God is** personal and he cares!

Read Psalm 139:1-18; Psalm 23 & Psalm 95:1-7

Consider the three possible combinations for God and discuss how they would impact on us.

- 1) God is all powerful and yet unloving
- 2) God is all loving and yet limited in his power
- 3) God is all powerful and loves perfectly

Genesis 3:8-9

⁸ Then the man and his wife heard the sound of the Lord God as he was walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and they hid from the Lord God among the trees of the garden. ⁹ But the Lord God called to the man, 'Where are you?'

When Adam and Eve turned their backs on God, he didn't turn his back on them. But he pursued them.

The bible is a story about men and God. It is ultimately a story about one man - the Lord Jesus Christ. This is where God became most personal!

While remaining sovereign, all-powerful and always in control - he also became one of us - a man. God's concern for the human race proved to be personal to him when he sent his Son into a world that didn't want to know him. The truth is that God knows what we need more than we do. God knows how to help us, and he can do it!

Prayer is the obvious benefit of a fixed relationship with God.

Prayer is faith speaking

God Has Time For Us – God Has Plans For You

Read Ephesians 2:1-10

What do these verses mean? Put it in your own words!

How are we described in verse 10?



Read 2 Corinthians 12:2-4

Visions like these are not the norm – even this passage describes it as a rare gift!

Notice, however, how the reality of heaven is described – the realness of God – and how Paul here describes the two worlds colliding – the realm of God with the realm of humans.

Read 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

What did Paul pray to God for?

What changed as a result of prayer?

As far as you are concerned, the greatest project that God cares about and God will work on is you!



Describe It!

Describe prayer - what is it and why do we do it?

Apply It!

If we don't pray, it is because we have fooled ourselves to think that we are in more control of our lives than God is. We have direct access to God through the LORD Jesus Christ. Because of Jesus, we get to call the almighty 'Father.' Prayer is not a meditation experiment. It is a real life conversation with the creator of everything. Our sovereign God has done everything for you so that you can come to him in prayer. He is always awake and always ready to hear us. He has plans for you and wants you to be interested in what they are. So, why don't we pray!

Prayer is knowing the one true God who loves you and invites you to speak.
